Operating Report

1. General information continued

Principal activities

The principal activities of Community & Public Sector Union (SPSF Group) New South Wales during the financial year were to operate as an industrial organisation, providing advice to its members within the areas of industrial disputes, pay negotiations, unfair dismissals etc.

No significant changes in the nature of the Branch's activity occurred during the financial year.

2. Operating results and review of operations for the year

Operating results

The profit of the Branch after providing for income tax amounted to (\$91,075) (2015: (\$53,931)).

Review of operations

A review of the operations of the Branch during the financial year and the results of those operations are contained in the discussion and analysis of the financial statements.

3. Financial review

Discussion and analysis of the financial statements

During the 12 months to June 2016, the Community and Public Sector Union (SPSF) New South Wales Branch recorded an operating deficit of (\$91,705). This compares with an operating deficit of (\$53,931) achieved over the previous 12 months.

Whilst membership numbers have continued to decline over the period, membership revenue has increased by 7% from \$740,678 in 2015 to \$793,163 in 2016. This increase is reflective of the increase in the annual fee charged per member. The fee charged in 2015 was \$4 per annum per member which was increased in April 2015 to \$6 per annum per member. The fee currently charged by the Branch is \$7 per annum per member which took effect in March 2016.

There were no donations in the 2016 financial year, which is a decrease of \$41,554 from 2015.

In regards to expenditure, Federal Capitation Fees decreased by approximately 2% to \$575,246 in 2016 (\$584,111 in 2015). This decrease is a result of the declining membership over the period.

The 2015 ACTU levy of \$78,744 and the imposition of a \$2 increase per member per annum in the affiliation fees charged by the ACTU from January 1 2016 contributed significantly to the overall deficit for the year.

The resulting deficit has resulted in a Net Liability position of \$166,969 for the Branch. In 2015, the Branch held a Net Liability position of \$75,894.

The Branch however has now increased its fees, which will be sufficient to cover the ACTU affiliation fees for the 2016/17 financial year (as discussed in the 2016 Report) and other Branch expenditure. This increase is also now agreed by the PSA NSW and will therefore be paid.

The position in relation to the ACTU levy, and rising affiliation fees, has been mentioned in the previous two reports. Outstanding levies were part-paid by loans that have now been repaid with one outstanding levy still to be paid. Please refer to Note 15.

4. Other items

Significant changes in state of affairs

There have been no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Branch during the year, except as noted above.

Events after the reporting date

- (1) The PSA NSW, the associated body of the CPSU, resolved on 14 November 2016 to increase subscriptions to \$7 per member to the SPSF NSW Branch, to take effect from 14 March 2016, which correlates with the NSW Branch resolution and therefore resolves differences in fees payable between the PSA NSW and SPSF NSW Branch;
- (2) A motion to rescind the increase in fees paid by PSA NSW on behalf of the SPSF members by 1.5% (which has been in disagreement between the two parties) was passed by the SPSF NSW Branch, in August 2016. Further a motion to increase the fees to \$7 per member was also passed (August 2016) and the Branch noted to increase fees in future years (to help cover rising ACTU costs and other rising expenses);
- (3) With the recession of the disputed "fee increase" motion by the SPSF NSW Branch in August 2016, the PSA converted the \$41,554 loan to the Branch into a donation;
- (4) The SPSF NSW Branch has fully paid the outstanding loan to the CPSU Federal Office in December 2016 and with the PSA conversion of the loan to a donation, 2 significant outstanding debts of the Branch have been met. The only longer term outstanding debt that remains is the 2015 ACTU levy of \$78,744.
- (5) The Branch Council of SPSF NSW Branch resolved on 15 November 2016 to approach the PSA to cover the final outstanding ACTU levy invoice and, if this is not agreed to, the Branch resolved to set a one off levy for members to cover this invoice;
- (6) On 14 March 2017, Ms Anne Gardiner resigned her position as Branch Secretary. As she did not hold office as Branch Secretary for more than 12 months, her resignation has triggered an election for that position. Mr Steve Turner, the Assistant Branch Secretary, is now the Acting Branch Secretary, until the election for the position of Branch Secretary is held.

Except for the above, no other matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or could significantly affect the operations of the Branch, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Branch in future financial years.

Right of members to resign

It is declared that a member has the right to resign from membership, in accordance with Rule 8 of the SPSF Group Rules and under Section 174 of the Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Act 2009.

Officers and employees who are superannuation fund trustee(s) or director of a company that is a superannuation fund trustee

During the financial year, Ms Sue Walsh, President was also President of the Public Service Association of NSW (PSA NSW), and National Executive Member of the Community and Public Sector Union.

Ms Walsh elected not to be a candidate in the 2016 CPSU-SPSF NSW Branch elections in 2016 and, as a consequence, relinquished the position of President of the CPSU-SPSF NSW Branch at the date that the result was declared (July 2016). This further resulted in Ms Walsh relinquishing her position as a member of the National Executive of the CPSU.

Ms Walsh also elected not to contest the President position in the 2016 Public Service Association of NSW election. As a result her position was relinquished at the date of declaration (October 2016).

Number of members

The number of members as at 30 June 2016 was 35,701 (2015: 37,191).

Number of employees

There were no employees employed by the organisation during the financial year

Joint employment arrangement

Employees of the Public Service Association of NSW (PSA NSW), who were declared to be "joint employees" of the Federal Office of the CPSU and the PSA NSW, were remunerated by the PSA NSW, but not by the Branch, or the Federal Office. The employees were declared to be "joint employees" to obtain federal Right of Entry permits, in order to assist Branch members employed in the federal arena.

No indemnities have been given or insurance premiums paid, during or since the end of the financial year, for any person who is or has been an officer or auditor of Community & Public Sector Union (SPSF Group) New South Wales.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 June 2016

The financial report covers Community & Public Sector Union (SPSF Group) New South Wales as an individual entity. Community & Public Sector Union (SPSF Group) New South Wales is a not-for-profit Branch, domiciled in Australia.

Community & Public Sector Union (SPSF Group) New South Wales is treated as an individual reporting unit under the Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Act 2009 (Cth). It is a Branch of the (Federal) Community and Public Sector Union, and although it has a separate ABN and separate GST registration, it is not a separate legal entity.

The functional and presentation currency of Community & Public Sector Union (SPSF Group) New South Wales is Australian dollars.

The amended financial report was authorised for issue by the Branch Council on 11 April 2017.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board which apply for the reporting period, and the Fair Work (Registered Organisation) Act 2009

These financial statements and associated notes comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Branch is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Branch and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Donations

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue

Interest is recognised as revenue when received.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(b) Revenue and other income continued

Subscriptions

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised as revenue when received.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Branch is entitled to it.

(c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(d) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting (i.e. on the date that the Branch becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument).

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial Assets

Financial assets are divided into the following categories which are described in detail below:

- loans and receivables;
- financial assets at fair value through profit or loss;
- available-for-sale financial assets; and
- held-to-maturity investments.

Financial assets are assigned to the different categories on initial recognition, depending on the characteristics of the instrument and its purpose. A financial instrument's category is relevant to the way it is measured and whether any resulting income and expenses are recognised in profit or loss or in other comprehensive income.

All income and expenses relating to financial assets are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income in the 'finance income' or 'finance costs' line item respectively.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 30 June 2016

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(d) Financial instruments continued

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The Branch's trade and other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is considered immaterial.

Significant receivables are considered for impairment on an individual asset basis when they are past due at the reporting date or when objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default.

The amount of the impairment is the difference between the net carrying amount and the present value of the future expected cash flows associated with the impaired receivable.

In some circumstances, the Branch renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the Branch does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss include financial assets:

- acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the near future
- designated by the entity to be carried at fair value through profit or loss upon initial recognition or
- which are derivatives not qualifying for hedge accounting.

The Branch has no financial assets which are designated as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities 'at fair value through profit or loss' or other financial liabilities depending on the purpose for which the liability was acquired.

(e) Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Branch determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(e) Impairment of non-financial assets continued

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(g) Going concern

Notwithstanding the Branch's deficiency in net assets, the financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis. This basis has been adopted because:

- (i) the Branch is a Branch of the CPSU, and is not itself a (separate) legal entity;
- (ii) the Branch has received financial support from the PSA and the CPSU, by way of interest-free loans and donations in February 2015, to allow the Branch to pay arrears of ACTU levies and meet its other regular commitments. These loans have now been repaid, with part of the loan from PSA NSW being coverted to a donation to the Branch; and
- (iii) The Branch Council has now set the membership fee at \$7 per member per year and the PSA NSW has resolved to pay that fee to the Branch;

(h) Adoption of new and revised accounting standards

The Branch has adopted all standards which became effective for the first time at 30 June 2016, the adoption of these standards has not caused any material adjustments to the reported financial position, performance or cash flow of the Branch.

(i) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations

The AASB has issued new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods. The members of the Branch Council have decided against early adoption of these Standards, but do not expect the adoption of these standards to have any impact on the reported position or performance of the Branch.

(j) Capitation fees and levies

Capitation fees and levies are to be recognised on an accrual basis and recorded as an expense in the year to which it relates.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The members of the Branch Council make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments continued

Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

4 Revenue and Other Income

Revenue from continuing operations

Finance income includes all interest-related income, other than those arising from financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. The following amounts have been included in the finance income line in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income for the reporting periods presented:

9 Financial Risk Management

The Branch is exposed to a variety of financial risks through its use of financial instruments.

The Branch's overall risk management plan seeks to minimise potential adverse effects due to the unpredictability of financial markets.

The Branch does not speculate in financial assets.

The most significant financial risks to which the Branch is exposed to are described below:

Specific risks

- Liquidity risk
- Credit risk
- Market risk currency risk, interest rate risk and price risk

Financial instruments used

The principal categories of financial instrument used by the Branch are:

- Trade receivables
- Cash at bank
- Trade and other payables

Objectives, policies and processes

Risk management is carried out by the Branch's Council. The Branch Secretary has primary responsibility for the development of relevant policies and procedures to mitigate the risk exposure of the Branch, these policies and procedures are then approved by the Branch Council.

Specific information regarding the mitigation of each financial risk to which the Branch is exposed is provided below.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk arises from the Branch's management of working capital. It is the risk that the Branch will encounter difficulty in meeting its financial obligations as they fall due.

The Branch manages its liquidity needs by carefully monitoring scheduled debt servicing payments for long-term financial liabilities as well as cash-outflows due in day-to-day business.

Liquidity needs are monitored in various time bands, on a day-to-day and week-to-week basis, as well as on the basis of a rolling 30-day projection.

The Branch's liabilities have contractual maturities which are summarised below:

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss to

Credit risk arises from cash and cash equivalents, derivative financial instruments and deposits with banks and financial institutions, as well as credit exposure to wholesale and retail customers, including outstanding receivables and committed transactions.

The Branch has adopted a policy of only dealing with creditworthy counterparties as a means of mitigating the risk of financial loss from defaults.

Trade receivables consist of a number of customers, primarily the Public Service Association of NSW, as the employer of the Branch's members. Ongoing credit evaluation is performed on the financial condition of accounts receivable.

The Branch Council receives regular reports summarising the turnover and trade receivables balance.

Management considers that all the financial assets that are not impaired for each of the reporting dates under review are of good credit quality, including those that are past due.

The credit risk for liquid funds and other short-term financial assets is considered negligible, since the counterparties are reputable banks with high quality external credit ratings.

The following table details the Branch's trade and other receivables exposure to credit risk (prior to collateral and other credit enhancements) with ageing analysis and impairment provided for thereon. Amounts are considered as 'past due' when the debt has not been settled, within the terms and conditions agreed between the Branch and the customer or counter party to the transaction. Receivables that are past due are assessed for impairment by ascertaining solvency of the debtors and are provided for where there is objective evidence indicating that the debt may not be fully repaid to the Branch

The balances of receivables that remain within initial trade terms (as detailed in the table) are considered to be of high credit quality.

(b) Transactions with related parties

Transactions between related parties are on normal commercial terms and conditions no more favourable than those available to other parties unless otherwise stated.

The payment of Federal Capitation Fees to the Federal Office has been disclosed in Note 5. The donation received in the 2015 financial year from PSA has been disclosed in Note 4. The loans received in the 2015 financial year, from PSA and the Federal Office, have been disclosed in section 3. of the Operating Report.

No other transactions occurred with related parties.

15 Events Occurring After the Reporting Date

- (1) The PSA NSW, the associated body of the CPSU, resolved on 14 November 2016 to increase subscriptions to \$7 per member to the SPSF NSW Branch, to take effect from 14 March 2016, which correlates with the NSW Branch resolution and therefore resolves differences in fees payable between the PSA NSW and SPSF NSW Branch;
- (2) A motion to rescind the increase in fees paid by PSA NSW on behalf of the SPSF members by 1.5% (which has been in disagreement between the two parties) was passed by the SPSF NSW Branch, in Augusts 2016. Further a motion to increase the fees to \$7 per member was also passed (August 2016) and the Branch noted to increase fees in future years (to help cover rising ACTU costs and other rising expenses);
- (3) With the recession of the disputed "fee increase" motion by the SPSF NSW Branch in August 2016, the PSA converted the \$41,554 loan to the Branch into a donation;
- (4) The SPSF NSW Branch has fully paid the outstanding loan to the CPSU Federal Office in December 2016 and with the PSA conversion of the loan to a donation, 2 significant outstanding debts of the Branch have been met. The only longer term outstanding debt that remains is the 2015 ACTU levy of \$78,744;
- (5) The Branch Council of SPSF NSW Branch resolved on 15 November 2016 to approach the PSA to cover the final outstanding ACTU levy invoice and, if this is not agreed to, the Branch resolved to set a one off levy for members to cover this invoice;
- (6) On 14 March 2017, Ms Anne Gardiner resigned her position as Branch Secretary. As she did not hold office as Branch Secretary for more than 12 months, her resignation has triggered an election for that position. Mr Steve Turner, the Assistant Branch Secretary, is now the Acting Branch Secretary, until the election for the position of Branch Secretary is held.

Except for the above, no other matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or could significantly affect the operations of the Branch, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Branch in future financial years.
